## European Intellectual History-E2 : Scholars in Exile 1933-1945



DELILLE, Emmanuel Raymond Joseph Humboldt University (Germany)

With the return of war to Europe's borders, the issue of scientists persecuted in their own countries and forced into exile is once again in the spotlight. This course provides an introduction to the history of German and European scholars, doctors and intellectuals, who fled their country during the Nazi regime (1933-1945). Selected examples and well-known case studies (Albert Einstein, Sigmund Freud, etc.) will complete the historical analysis, in a comparative perspective. A series of classic academic texts will be read in groups to document studies on migration, forced exile, Displaced Persons (DPs) and refugee scholars in modern times.

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### European Welfare State-E2 : history, regulations, crisis and future

This lecture intends to bring an overview of the history and the actual status of the European welfare state. It will not focus only on narrow legal topics but will show the development of the various systems, which provide social security, as result of a European history, a specific mindset and idea of the relation between individuals and society. The interdependencies between social security, the status of families, the status of legal regulation and specific institutions will be shown. The crisis of welfare state, which is result of economic, demographic and political developments maybe even will challenge democracy at all.

## The French Language in the World-E2 : Language Contact and Intercultural Communication

Université du Luxembourg (Grand Duchy of Luxembourg)

My course has the objective to show the diversity of situations in the world where French is taught and learned, in formal/institutional and informal settings. We will study the use of French in different environments: in France with its regional varieties, the French-speaking Pacific, Africa and the Indian Ocean, Luxembourg, Switzerland and Belgium. We will critically discuss the idea of francophonie from a postcolonial point of view. Our focus will lie on educational settings from kindergarten to school and university, but also the family language policies in linguistically and culturally diverse settings. We will treat matters of language contact, code-switching and translanguaging with specific reference to language teaching and learning.

This course focuses on Southeast Asia literatures and its relationship with the region's rich cultural background and socio-political changes. It introduces how Southeast Asian literatures have evolved through modern history and how social, political, and cultural issues have influenced its development. From historical works of the 19th and early 20th centuries to those contemporary ones, this course analyzes contemporary literature from a postcolonial perspective. In particular, the course focuses on issues relating to gender and human rights, as well as changes in society and the environment in modern literature.

## Introduction to Himalayan Anthropology-E2

This course is designed as a general introduction to Himalayan anthropology and research topics that have interested scholars of the region over the years. This course introduces ways of understanding the Himalayan region through selected readings from anthropology, history, geography, and other disciplines. In particular, the course will focus on understanding the relations between ecology, cultural and ethnic diversity, and subsistence-based ways of life in the region. In the course, we will closely examine the major social, economic, political, and ecological transformations that the region has undergone in recent decades to broaden our understanding of how the people and communities in the Himalayan region remake and continue their traditional ways of life by resisting and appropriating the forces of the state, modernity, and globalization. We will use ethnographic texts, videos and other materials to understand the people, culture, and histories of the Himalayan region. Lectures, discussions, and presentations will be the general format of the course. The course materials will focus largely on Nepal, but students with interests in other Himalayan countries and regions will have an opportunity to explore their interests through additional reading assignments.

## The Energy Transformation in the EU and Japan-E2

ZINOVIEV, Vladimir Yordanov University of National and World Economy Sofia (Republic of Bulgaria)

Students from all fields of study are welcome. The course will make a comparison of the energy transformation in the EU and Japan. The focus will be on the economic benefits of decarbonization of the power generators and consumers, integrating storage solutions and the redesign of the grid infrastructure. The students will navigate the complexities of transitioning from traditional fossil fuels to renewable energy sources, including solar, wind, hydro, and bioenergy. The role of technological advancements and digital tools in optimizing these energy sources will form a core part of the course. The course also addresses the challenges and opportunities in smart grid technologies, digitalization of energy systems, and the integration of e-Mobility charging infrastructure for real-time energy management.

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## Global Englishes of the Past and Present-E2

This intensive course will examine the origins, development and characteristics of the English Language within Great Britain and globally as a language of colonisation. Important themes which the teaching and learning will address include: (1) Key changes in English from the Anglo-Saxon period to the present day (e.g. the Great Vowel Shift); (2) English in language contact situations within the British Isles and further afield (e.g. contact with Celtic, Romance, Scandinavian languages); (3) The Spread of Innovations; (4) Language Attitudes and Social Justice.
