| Value, Meaning, and the Shape of a Life | | | | | | | | | |
| <p>What makes something valuable? How do norms, ideals, and social expectations shape our judgments and actions? How do people make sense of their lives in the face of conflict, loss, regret, and hope?</p> <p>This course introduces philosophical reflection on value, meaning, and normativity as they arise in human life. Rather than treating values as abstract objects or fixed rules, we will examine how practices of evaluation are embedded in action, social life, and self-understanding. Particular attention will be paid to how character is formed and assessed, how social norms and relations with others shape responsibility and recognition, and how perception and attention influence what matters to us.</p> <p>The course explores how values are expressed, challenged, and revised over time, and how individuals make sense of their lives through patterns of action, response, and reflection. Drawing on examples from personal life, shared practices, and everyday decision-making, students will encounter influential ideas from twentieth- and twenty-first-century philosophy that continue to shape contemporary debates about value, meaning, responsibility, and transformation.</p> <p>No prior knowledge of philosophy is assumed. Lectures will use PowerPoint. Each class will consist of approximately 60 minutes of lecture followed by group discussion and the use of a shared document to facilitate interaction.
